Bluff Country Collaborative: A multipartner, braided funding, experiential learning program in Southeast Minnesota.

Presenters: Brian Cashman and Dawn Lubahn

This breakout session will examine the past, present, and future of the Bluff Country Collaborative – an effort focused on integrating schools, employers, local government, and community resources to provide meaningful career-connected learning to the next generation of workers in Southeast Minnesota. A semi-finalist for the Department of Education's Career Z Challenge to Expand Work-based Learning Opportunities to Gen Z.

- Better understand the challenges and opportunities for career-connected learning in rural Minnesota.
- Analyze the challenges and opportunities of implementing a multi-stakeholder, multi-braided funding mechanism.
- Be able to reflect on the challenges and opportunities of the use of metrics when analyzing career connected learning.

Building Better Connections using the Ted Lasso Way.

Presenter: Kelley McClure-Mork

How to build meaningful connections between high school and business industry. When it comes to our consortium partnerships, engagement is key. But what do you do when you start to see patterns of dwindling engagement—even for things like yearly paperwork? It might be time for you and your team to tap into the Ted Lasso Way! This session will show how the Mid-Minnesota Consortium increased their engagement of high school partners from 28% to 70% by using the Ted Lasso Way focusing on three main areas: Connection, Influence, and Community. By tapping into simple acts of empathy, kindness, and positivity, they found creative ways to up the engagement and improve connections with high schools and Ridgewater College programs.

- Identify one way to get schools to "buy in" without discussing recruitment or enrollment.
- Understand the 3-legged stool concept related to Connection, Influence, and Community.

Work-Based Learning Initiative

If you are looking for a way to accelerate the growth of internships and apprenticeships in your consortium, this session will outline Hennepin West's emerging efforts to amplify work-based learning. Over the last two years, consortium schools increased access to work-related opportunities for students, with an intentional focus on diverse and special populations. Consortium leaders will walk participants through the milestones they set for designing a work-based learning ecosystem, so schools could increase access to paid, authentic work experiences for secondary and post-secondary students.

Attendees will:

- Hear examples of how we differentiated approaches across schools.
- See how we empowered existing work-based learning strategies and supported schools as they co-designed new powerful practices.
- Learn how working with a work-based learning intermediary enabled us to scale our efforts, augmenting the limited capacity we have given our numerous priorities as consortium directors.
- Review data collected from student-led performance reviews and from insights illuminate through post-surveys that measure DEIB.

At Saint Paul College, we are focusing on CTE and Perkins Special Groups. We are expanding our Perkins funds beyond equipment funding and focusing efforts on special populations in our community.

- Increase enrollment for Special Populations and veterans.
- Redirect Perkins funds within Student Support Services offices to recruit/retain/graduate/job placement and training.
- Recognize the importance of Inclusion and equity in Trades and CTE programs, via professional development for faculty and staff, for example.
